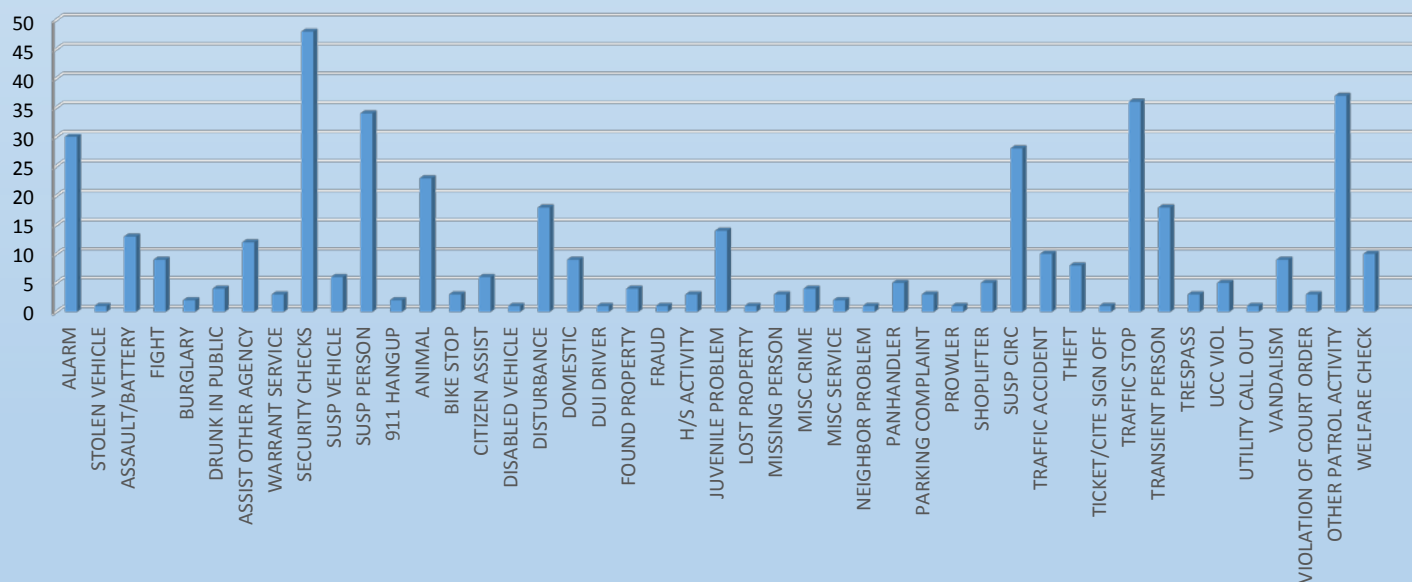

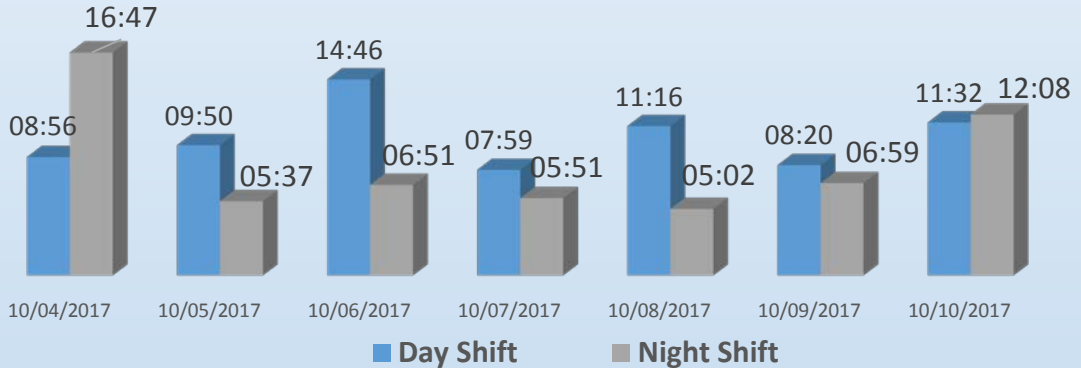

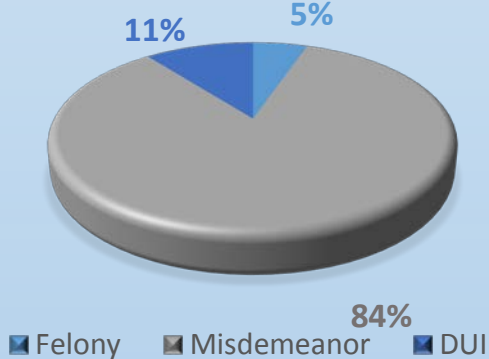
Daily Average Response Times (mm:ss)



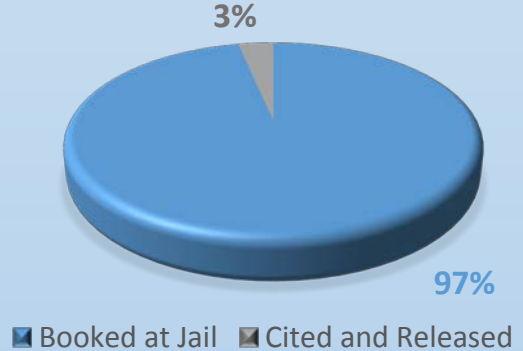
The Patrol Division's response time to in-progress calls was just over 3 minutes.

The average response time to all calls was just over 7 minutes.

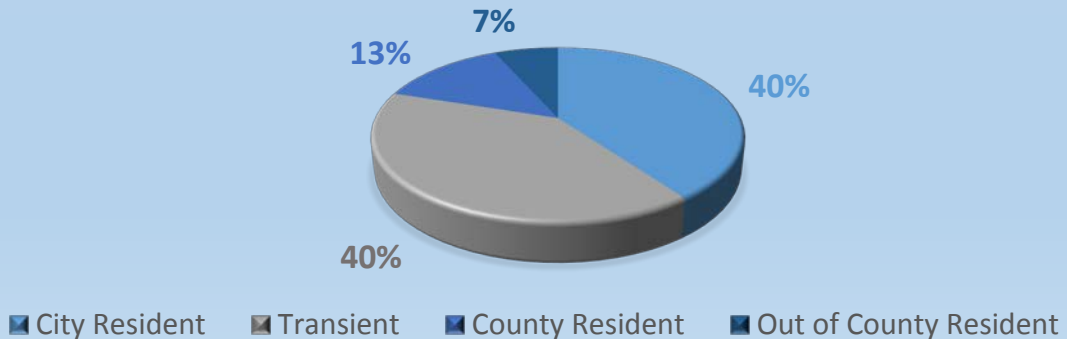
CRIME BREAKDOWN

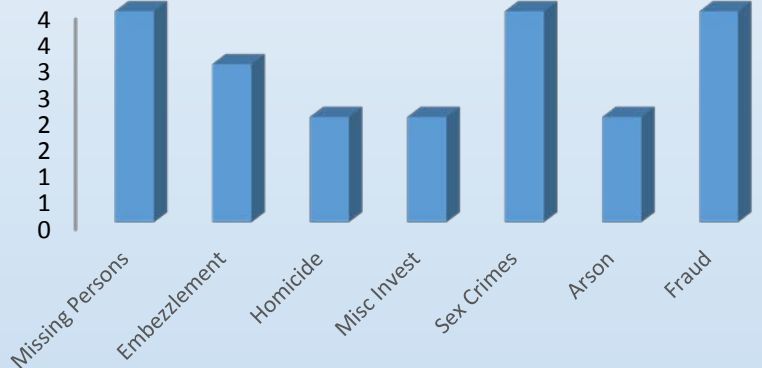

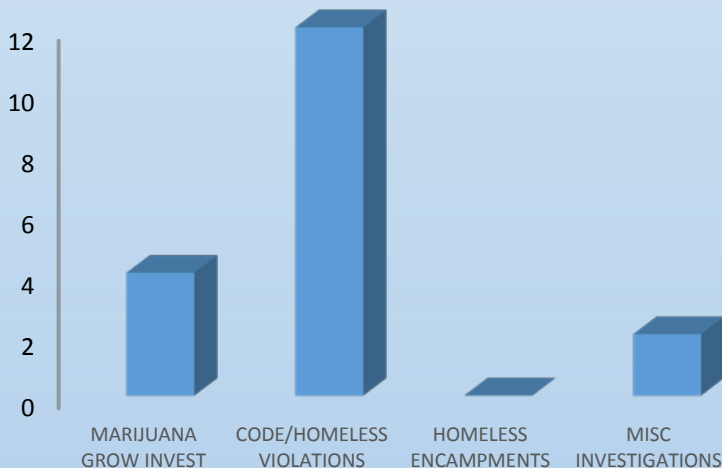

We would like to share an example of two of your officers going above and beyond for a family here in Ukiah. We had a situation here in the UVMC Emergency Department where the father of a critically ill child was attempting to take the child and leave against medical advice. We called UPD because of the need to protect the child and staff in this situation. Officers Brazill and Cooper responded and, after being informed of the situation, spoke with the father of the child. They were able to calm him down and help convince him that the hospital staff were only trying to help his child.

This would have been enough, but during their conversation, the father of the child cited several social issues that were adding stress and anxiety to the already terrifying situation of having a gravely ill child: having to be out of his current apartment by tomorrow, not having childcare for his other children, and upcoming court dates. The officers called the family's landlord to explain why they needed more time to move, helped the father get in touch with extended family to arrange for childcare, and rescheduled his upcoming court dates. After only a few minutes, the situation was diffused and the patient's father was able to be calm and support his sick child.

We would like to thank Officers Brazill and Cooper for their compassion, quick thinking, and professionalism.

We truly are lucky here in our community to have such great law enforcement professionals, people who have committed their careers to caring for others and keeping our community safe. If a career like this interests you, please consider joining our team. Your work will truly make a difference.
