





The Patrol Division's response time to in-progress calls was just over 3 minutes.


The average response time to all calls was just over 8 minutes.

CRIME BREAKDOWN




■ Felony ■ Misdemeanor ■ DUI





Creating Chaos

A few weeks ago, Ukiah Unified School District Superintendent Debra Kubin received an email warning her of a school shooting. The email, which did not specify a place or time, warned of violence on a school campus.

Luckily, before receiving this threat, Ms. Kubin had received a phone call from the superintendent in Healdsburg, informing her that the email was being investigated as a hoax.

It turns out that school district superintendents throughout the United States also received this terrible email as a prank—a contest to see who could cause the most chaos within our schools.

This is a sick joke; there is nothing funny about creating chaos in our schools. Our schools should be places of safety.

If you hear of a threat to any school campus, please share that information with law enforcement immediately. We take these threats seriously and will do all we can to help our community be as prepared as possible for any crisis. The best tool law enforcement has to prevent crimes is the help we get from people like you. When something seems wrong, out of place, or a little suspicious, trust your instincts and contact us.

Sadly, school and workplace shootings happen and it is important to be prepared. If you are ever caught in an active shooter situation, the rules are simple: run, hide and fight.

If you can run from danger, then run. If you can't run or if running puts you in harm's way, then hide: lock and/or barricade the door, close the blinds, and be as quiet as possible while calling 911 to let us know where you are. If you can't hide, your last option is to fight back.

You're probably thinking, "Is it reasonable for me to try to fight off an active shooter?" Our response is, YES! I promise that first responders will be running to help you win the fight, so keep fighting until we get there. Commit to winning the battle; your chance of survival is proven to be much greater if you take action.

Children are most likely to be victims of crimes between 3:00 PM and 6:00 PM, after school when most adults are still at work. Without the Boys and Girls Club, finding a safe place for kids can be difficult and expensive. Today, more than 180 schoolchildren participate in the Boys and Girls Club afterschool program, and as you'd expect, paying for an operation like this requires tens of thousands of dollars.

This is where your support can make all the difference.

For many years now, the Ukiah Daily Journal has conducted a spring fund drive to help the Boys and Girls Club meet its operational expenses, and the Ukiah Police Department is extremely happy to be part of this effort. This year, we are working with community partners to kick off the drive with donations of \$15,000 from UPD and \$4,000 each from the Savings Bank of Mendocino County and the Vargas brothers.
