


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
Daily Average Response Times (mm:ss)



The Patrol Division's response time to in-progress calls was just over 4 minutes.


The average response time to all calls was just over 9 minutes.

CRIME BREAKDOWN





■ City Resident ■ Transient ■ County Resident ■ Out of County Resident



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


