

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
Daily Average Response Times (mm:ss)




The Patrol Division's response time to in-progress calls was just over 4 minutes.

The average response time to all calls was just over 8 minutes.


CRIME BREAKDOWN





Slow Summer Days

I love spending time outside during the summer here in Ukiah, especially in the early mornings before everyone wakes up and the day really gets going. Things go at a slower pace. There aren't as many cars on the street and the weather is absolutely perfect for taking walks or going for bike rides to get a little exercise.

Sadly, some people say they don't go out as often as they'd like because they are afraid to walk and bike on some of our more congested streets. You know, if we all slowed down a little when driving from place to place, it would improve local pedestrian and bike safety a lot.

The reality is, during busy days when we're running behind or trying to get a whole bunch of things accomplished, sometimes we don't drive as slowly as we should. Each time we speed, we increase the likelihood that we'll collide with another car, or even hit a bicyclist or pedestrian. This would turn a busy day into a terrible day—not only would an accident prevent us from accomplishing our other goals, the consequences could be expensive or even tragic. Please, slow down.

One local group committed to improving bike and pedestrian safety, as well as getting us out walking and cycling, is Walk & Bike Mendocino. In addition to advocating for community safety improvements for walkers and cyclists, this local non-profit organization hosts regular safety events for kids and other bike-related events for the whole family. In fact, this week Walk & Bike Mendocino is sponsoring an event that just might be reason enough to get that bike out of the garage.

On Thursday, July 12, Walk & Bike Mendocino is hosting a pirate-themed community bike ride for the entire family. This is a great way to get outside and get a little exercise safely, and most importantly, to have some fun with your kids. Everyone is invited to dress up as pirates and meet up behind the County Courthouse in Ukiah at 5:30 PM. The ride begins at 6:00 PM. Once the ride is over, you can return to School Street for some great food at the Thursday Night Market hosted by the Ukiah Main Street Program.

Or, if you'd rather catch a movie, pump up the tires on those family bikes and ride down to the Moonlight Movie Madness in the Alex Thomas Plaza. This Friday, July 13, the Ukiah Main Street Program and City of Ukiah Recreation Department host the movie Despicable Me 3. The movie starts at 7:00 PM.
